#### DID YOU KNOW? GAME BIRD FUN FACTS



Game birds are wild birds, or sometimes birds bred in captivity, that are hunted by humans for sport or food, such as quail, pheasants, and ducks. Pheasants are our main game bird, which calls the Halter grounds its home. Understanding some of their behaviors helps give us insight into their lives when we walk the fields.

Pheasants, originating from Asia, are not native to the US, and their first successful introduction occurred in 1881 when Judge Owen Nickerson Denny shipped 80 Chinese Ringneck pheasants to his home in the Willamette Valley, Oregon. Pheasants are non-migratory birds that spend their entire year within a home range of about one square mile. They prefer to run rather than fly, reaching speeds of 8-10 mph on the ground, which is why a dog helps flush them up into the air, where they can reach airspeeds between 38-60 mph. They prefer flying into headwinds, which provide better lift for short, explosive flights. Phasants are resilient animals, so much so that they can swim if they feel trapped and can't find a way to take flight. These birds can also survive without food during severe weather conditions.
